MICHAEL CRAGO SPORTS





The SDSD team posted a stunning victory over Harrisburg, the heavily favored team across the state of South Dakota, with the score of 69-57. They made a headline in the Argus Leader Newspaper. Four starters including Mike Crago, Jan Buri, David Soukup and Doug Schweitzer hit double figures in the semifinal slot at the Sioux Falls Arena. The SDSD team coached by Larry Puthoff held a seasonal record of 11-11, the best season ever since 1954.
- 2) The region 5B Track & Field Meet in May 1973. Specifically, the SDSD Medley Relay team established a Region 5B record at Lennox with its 3:50:0 Mike ran with Ron Lerdal, Lyle Grate, and Leslie Barber. At that time, Larry Puthoff coached the team.
- 3) The annual MAAD tournament. For several years, Mike enjoyed participating in the annual tournament. He received several individual awards including the Individual Sportsmanship Award (3 times) and the Most Assists Champion. He was eventually induced into the MAAD Hall of Fame back in 1984.
- 4) Throughout his sports career, Mike was supported bu excellent coaches including Ron Mitchell, James Ponwith, Larry Puthoff, Mark Gunderson and Larry Strain. Mike remains grateful for their support continues to look up to them.
